Our Carving Progress

Jordan Makower's Linoleum Blocks Jockeying for First

I like reading about horse racing, and wanted to carve a scene where three of them were 'neck and neck', heading into the last turn.

It is a 4" x 6" linoleum block, with figures outlined, and indicating motion.

This image is done in low contrast, to show the shallow carving.

The track that the horses are running on is lightened, leaving marks under the hooves to give the impression of dirt being 'scuffed up'. The jockeys' uniforms are colored, and the horses have some dynamic shading. I thought about lightening the jockeys' shirts, but it might have been a distraction.

The periphery of the jockeys on their horses shows remnants of my carving but, rather than remove them, I thought it serendipitously added to their implied motion.

The lines 'outside the windows', where linoleum has been removed, shouldn't appear in the final print.

There are carve lines for fur, lighter fur illuminated through the window, and fewer lines for fur that is shadowed. A 3-dimensional appearance is always sought for in my artwork.

Occasionally, when I stopped to get gas for our RV, Casey would take the opportunity to sit in the driver's seat.

This linoleum block is 4" x 6". This is Casey, our Golden Retriever, who loved tennis balls and stuffed animals. He never tore any of his toys apart, and always seemed to be saying, "What fun thing are we going to do today?" He just enjoyed being around us. Have been working on the furry areas; some quite lighted by the surroundings, others darker, in shadows. Casey is surrounded by toys.

The parallel lines, indicating distance, may be modified before carving.
