Then I found out that knots are much harder than sap wood, and the gouges would catch in the radial cracks caused by drying. I had envisioned a broad bowl but ended up with more of a cylinder (no photo in this newsletter). The main carving I did was a 25th

anniversary plaque for my sister's wedding present. The names are interwoven, his on top, hers on the bottom, family name across the center. Summer Dance Lesson (1957)

I worked at the Hotel Mahopac (NY State) in the summer of 1957, and was responsible to teach one group lesson each week, as well as to give any private lessons to couples who requested it. I was given free room, board, and about \$20/week. It was enough for me to buy gas to visit my sweetheart in New Jersey and travel back to the hotel (about 130 miles, one way)


This 3" x 4" linoleum block may have been too small to show desired details, although this medium is fine-grained, it doesn't tolerate very close-spaced cuts and 'fractures.



An attempt was made to use a small roller to apply green to the treetops, and a different roller for brown to the people and foreground.

A few different printing papers were used.

The cleanest print was done with a single color.



Photographer's Darkroom (1960)

This is a 3" x 4" linoleum block. I never had a darkroom this large. Usually, my setup was in a cramped closet. The enlarger shown was an old special model Graflex camera, equipped to take photos and make prints from the cut-film it used.



Easier to carve and print than any of the previous ones that I've done.

One thing (out of many) that I learned was to wash/clean the block after making a few impressions, in order to remove ink left over in the block's 'grooves' from previously made prints.

Garden Rose

My plan was to cut away the 'leaves' or find some way to print the rose in reddish-pink and separately print the leaves in dark green.

I hesitate to take either of those steps, since I like the print the way it is. The really light areas are places where sunlight is filtering through the shrubs.





Remember that the print is only 2" high by 3" wide. This print was made by the sole use of the 'brayer' (a silk-covered pressure pad). All my other prints relied on fingertip pressure on the back of the paper, over the entire area.


Experimenting on Purple with white ink

The variables here were:

- -Speedball 'rubber' media: was easy to carve, but can't carve lines too close, or medium brakes off. It is fragile, so I temporarily mounted it on back of a standard Speedball linoleum block.
- -Printing with white ink: since the carving was just single-lined outlining, the areas would be in white. Not producing negative, as done with linoleum medium.
- -Brayer pressure: much less effort to produce a print. Too much pressure blurs lines.

Paper was thin 'construction paper': not as thin as regular 20-weight computer paper, and it had a slightly rougher texture. Darker paper was 'heavier' and rougher.
